Wilson School Outreach Service

The Specialist service has had another busy term supporting identified ORS students in the mainstream as part of the wider support team. We have been attending IEP's and appreciate the ability to work as part of a team to support change and consolidate skills.

The service supports 16 students across 10 schools. The service has recently undertaken its annual evaluation and the very positive feedback again reflects that the skills and knowledge that the specialist teachers bring to supporting students, schools and families/ whanau is very much valued.

Physiotherapy and Occupational Therapy

Students and their trusty steeds

On Monday mornings, seven students with a variety of special needs from Wilson School step into the Riding for the Disabled (RDA) arena at Silverdale with their ponies. During these weekly lessons, students ride and practice skills such as focus, balance, communication and more. A trained volunteer leads each student's mount, and two volunteers walk along either side to ensure the rider's safety.



From the barn, to the sensory forest, to the arena and back, the ponies are kind and grounded with the students. They walk calmly, slowly; and the students pick up on the relaxed nature of their ponies.

While it might seem counterintuitive to mix large, powerful animals and children with challenges ranging from autism to visual impairments, the size of these gentle creatures is one of the factors that make them ideal therapy animals. RDA offers a unique form of exercise for our students.



From a physical standpoint, riding gives students the chance to stretch and move muscles in a way that may not be possible with other forms of exercise. The student's position in the saddle and the complex movement of the horse is a form of therapy, enabling students to develop their sense of body awareness, and help improve balance, muscular strength, posture and coordination.

Activities for the riding sessions vary. Students who need to build strength might practice standing up in their stirrups, while students who need to improve focus might ride through an obstacle course. Games such as throwing balls into buckets, rings onto sticks are a large part of the session. Games like this might seem simple, but they help students build core strength, balance and coordination while learning skills such as following directions.





Student's well-being also benefits from developing a connection with a social animal known for being responsive to human emotional states. Instructors say that students improve their emotional expression and self-regulation and can see how student anxiety decreases as they gain confidence in the new environment.

Most importantly, riding offers a great sense of fun and freedom. It's exciting to watch the connection between the student and their horse develop as the year progresses.

Students are selected on a rotation basis, alternating annually between Base school and Satellite classes. School Occupational therapist Angela and Physio Dermot work alongside the RDA Coach to formulate goals for each student for the year.

Speech Language Therapist

Communication is a big part of learning at Wilson school. In all areas of learning, students need to be able to understand their learning goal and be able to communicate with their teachers, therapists and friends. The Speech- Language Therapists at Wilson school are here to support and promote communication. We do this in many different ways within the school.

Some of the things we do are:

- Meet with Teachers to look at communication goals and strategies for students that can be worked on every day in the classroom.
- Assess individual students by observing them, working with them in the classroom or 1:1 assessment to find out how to support and develop their communication skills.
- Identify if there are any AAC systems (Augmentative and Alternative Communication) that may help the student to communicate.
- Work jointly with Talk Link to assess students who need a complex specialist assessment to identify the most appropriate AAC system for them.
- Offer training to Teachers and Parents on specific communication systems and how to use these in the classroom.
- Work directly with students within the classroom in groups.
- Assess eating, drinking and swallowing to provide programmes for students with difficulties in this area (dysphagia).
- Work closely with other members of the therapy team to find out how best to engage students in learning and communication.
- Work 1:1 with students to teach a new skill that can then be supported within the classroom.
- Meet with Parents to give advice on how to support communication/eating and drinking programmes at home.
- Support with the assessment of literacy (reading/writing and spelling) and how to build communication skills through literacy.
- Attend IEPs, Transition to Adult life (TAL) meetings and enrollment meetings.



We visited Auckland Zoo to see the animals. It was a fun topic.




Windy Ridge 2



We had a great time studying plants. We learnt so much about the plants and how to grow them.








