Principal's Message - Term 2

Kia ora koutou

I would like to introduce myself as the new Principal at Wilson School. I've received a warm welcome from the students and staff team here and am very much looking forward to building relationships with the whole school community over time. I have a background of supporting students with a range of needs and have leadership experience from special schools in New Zealand and the UK. My move to Wilson School comes from Napier, I was very pleased that the alert level was reduced just in time allowing me to travel and be at school when it reopened.

It was wonderful seeing the students return to school last week, staff were greeted with lots of smiles and excitement. I'm very impressed to see how the Wilson Team have embraced the Level 2 recommendations and have made sure our classrooms were ready for everyone to return.

Rosemary and I met with the Ministry of Health and Ministry of Education last week. They provided very clear communication and guidance to schools throughout lockdown, that has continued now school has reopened. The main messages from the meeting were -

- There is no evidence of community transmission of Covid-19 in NZ.
- Covid-19 is droplet spread, avoid face-to-face interaction if physical distancing is not possible.
- Avoid touching your face.
- Wash your hands regularly, using soap for at least 20 seconds.

It was comforting to hear that doctors will continue to keep Covid testing as a priority, especially when the patient reports symptoms linked to the virus, eg coughing or a sore throat. I suspect that Covid tests will form part of our 'normal' routine and everyday life for some time to come.

Due to the extended period of time everyone was out of school for, we have decided to postpone the teacher only day originally planned for Tuesday 2nd June. This will be moved to later in the year.

I look forward to meeting you all in the near future, if there is anything you need please don't hesitate to contact me.

School Transport

It is the parent/caregiver's responsibility to secure car seats into the vehicle, buckle children into their seats and to receive the child at the end of the day. Drivers contracts state that they are not allowed to buckle the children in, so please support them by doing this each day. It is important that there is an adult at home when the child arrives from school. For safety purposes the driver **may not leave** the van as there are other students needing supervision.

Any change of address needs at least 10 days notification before the necessary changes can be actioned, make sure you contact the school well in advance.

The power of video.....

During Covid-19 levels 4 and 3, the therapy team needed to look at different ways of providing support and engaging with teachers, students and whanau. I asked members of the therapy team to give some feedback on how they used video during lock down. Here are some of their comments, the ways we used video as a team and what we have learned during the process:

"In light of the COVID-19 crisis, I found myself researching how best to support our students through video conferencing also known as telehealth, and actively working to adapt my practice to meet the needs of students and their families in the quickly changing face of education." Angela OT

"The greatest power of video for me was the opportunity to see videos of the Zoom shared reading sessions I was able to get some insight into the students' home life, which was great... "Susie SLT

"I found it an effective way of working together with the teacher and caregivers, to share ideas and experiences, and support opportunities to work towards the students learning goals, in their home environments" Ange OT

"It challenged me to come up with creative ways to work with families and class teams. I learnt how to use Sway to share longer videos with families and how to put shorter clips onto seesaw". Laura SLT

"The videoing worked in two ways. We had a parent send us a video clip of a student using her walking frame and switches at home...... it's a great way for parents to contact us to explain what they see and then ask questions. Dermot PT



We have learnt that

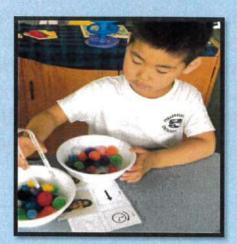
- Using video clips can be a powerful way of sharing what we do with Whanau and how we work with their children.
- Videos can be used for joint planning and goal setting, enabling us to work together as a team to plan next steps and identify any support that is needed.
- Our students often engage differently with this media than face to face.
 It is possible to engage with our students via the mode of video even those who are non-verbal communicators.
- Using videos can be fun.
- Videos can be used as a basis for training. They can be used to show how to use equipment or therapy techniques with no need to provide detailed written instructions.
- Demonstrating the use of AAC/equipment and activities to support home learning can be shared via Sway and Seesaw with parents. Often parents are not able to come into class to see what we do and modelling on video to show how we work with students could give families information and ideas.

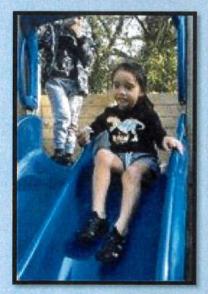
Room 1 - New Entrants

We can't wait for more lessons at school and for everything to go back to normal.

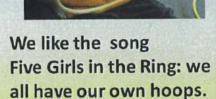
Room 3

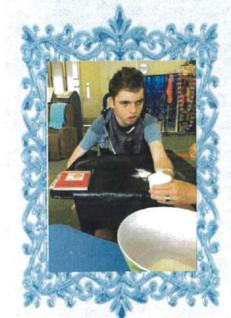




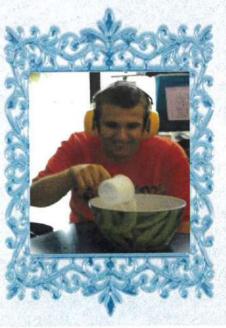














BAYSWATER 1: Successful Home Learning Programme

We love being back at school and seeing our friends in class again.













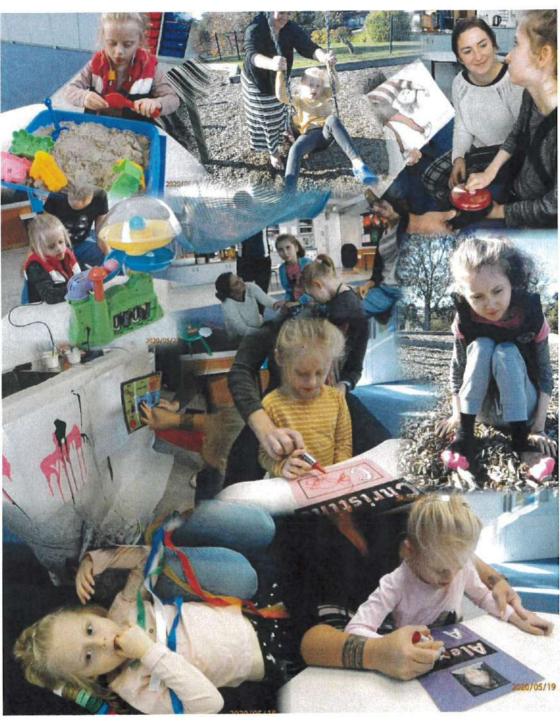




Windy Ridge 2

Term 2 started with us learning at home. A highlight was our Zoom Scavenger Hunt.



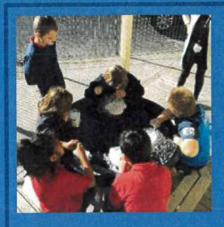


Back at school we were greeted by a friendly cat and lots of autumn leaves!

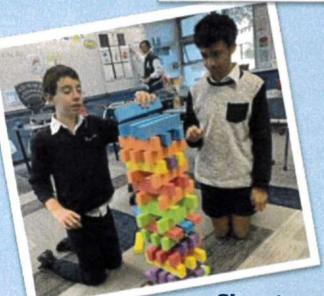

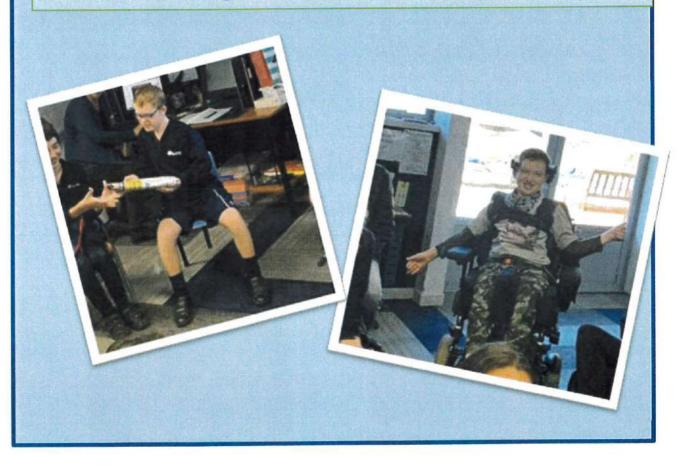

Three of our students celebrated birthdays in lockdown ... so we had a big party when we got back to school!



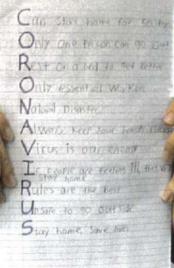
College Junior

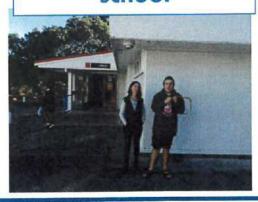
